



## GARRISON PLAYERS' 66PETER PAN? WILL DELIGHT THE YOUNG

"Do you believe in fairies?" If your answer is wrong, do not go to King George's Hall, The Missions to Seamen, this weekend. The Garrison Players have tried to reproduce an essentially Christmas atmosphere by producing the perennial "Peter Pan" with a cast mainly of young people for whom the play was originally written.

This play may not be J. M. Barrie at his best but from the applause and squeals of the younger members of last night's audience he apparently still retains some theatrical magic. To Barrie and this young cast, de-spite all elderly doubts, we must offer congratulations for enjoyment clearly given to the au-dience and to the cast themselves.

So while modern critics may say Barrie is sentimental, outdated or nonsensically whim-sical, yet a Hongkong's audience can share the entertainment that every year is a popular London Christmas favourite. Spirit Of Youth

Let us not be too serious about this production. Because the cast were enjoying themselves, the audience also enjoy-ed themselves. The "stars" were rightly Peter Pan, Wendy, Captain Hook and Smee.

Regan Babb suggested "the spirit of youth"; she may not have been as spiteful as Jean Forkes-Robertson or as impish as Ann Todd but probably this proves that only age can make you regret your youth. It was a light-hearted performance nicely, if not very sharply de-fined. I wish Peter had been allowed to fly!

Margaret Blunden was particularly good as Wendy because of her phrasing, emphasis and timing. And she looked charmingly motherly.

Ted Thomas and Mario Ferras ranted and roared in the

good effect. We were glad when they appeared. I hope the young members of the audience were as terrified of Hook as I was when I first saw this play.

It would be invidious to pick out any single member of the supporting cast; it is a children's play and all the children showed an individuality of character that probably their seniors would lack.

### The Faults

Now for the faults. I think the Producer and "Adaptor" were somewhat afraid of the text and the result was that Barrie disappeared in a society of Barrie disappeared in a series of episodes not very clearly or coherently connected. The important moments were some-times missed; we were never told why the crocodile had an alarm-clock tick (and why was the spectacular crocodile not allowed to appear on stage?). Nor could I quite understand why a mimic ballet had to replace Barrie's own script. Latifa Rah-man had a delicacy and sense of rhythm which were commend-able, but the famous Tinker Bell dying scene should have been done by the "real" Peter.

The whole production was too slow. This may have been due to "first night nerves" of such a young cast. I am sure it will speed up and we can cheerfully congratulate all these young people for giving us in Hong-kong a Christmas entertainment, which, despite all its faults still reflects the appropriate dream of vouth.
