The Giant was the success of the evening, and I wish he had appeared more often.

I would prefer to draw a seasonal veil over the rest. Claribelle, the cow, tried hard without much encouragement or disguise. The "extras" tried to add vivacity and enjoyment to the general effect, but they had little chance to sing audibly or dance with grace.

Lionel Levin's sets were imaginative and too good for the costumes that appeared in front of them.

I would like to believe that later performances will be better. I hope so, as on this first night showing the production is a sad conclusion to the present year in which the local standard has been so high.

Jack, played by Chris Barber, seemed to have an almost incidental role. It was a night for the clowns and for their own part they were a clowning success.
