## SHAKY START, BUT THE CHILDREN ENJOYED It

TVHE Garrison Players pantomime "Jack and the Beanstalk" got off to a shaky start last night at the Missions to Seamen theatre-but there are a lot of laughs and plenty of good fun for the children.


#### Abstract

A number of criticisms can be made. The stage was too small by far. The beanstalk consequently was inclined to be unobtrusive. Indeed I did not nctice it until Jack began his climb (up an ill-concealed ladder) Players at various times scemed a little lost. The chorus on the road to market was sadly lacking in voice. There was an unexplained obstacle left on the stage in one scone which one of the back-moving dancers, of course, almost fell over. The jokes were often a little flat and ceriainly well above the children's heads. The play, in short, seemed in need of a few more rehearsals and more critical direction in the early stages.


Having seid all this, I can imagine that more than half the audience who saw last night's show - the younger half and possibly a good many of the older half, - will heartily disagree with me.
For there were many laughs, particularly when the cast came belling off the stage and chasing around the hall.

Eald-headed Niario Ferras as Es\% and Norman Roper as Chips got a good many welldeserved laughs while Odorouss
E.gg, played by Patricia Haynes, worked hard in her everindignant role.
Jack, played by Chris Barber, seemed to have an almost incidental role. It was a night for the clowns-and for their own part they were a clowning success.

The giant was a wee bit too egrish and might give some small boys and girls a scare. I remember in Tientsin in 1934 seeing the same "pantc" at the church hall. But all we saw of the giant on stage was one huge boot. I remember going cut afterwards and looking up at the roof for the rest of him.

good-will may be, let it be admitted that this is not a good production. Some years ago I saw my first pantomime "Dick Whittington" in Hongkong. It was good. The Garrison Players gave us a theatrical treat in "The Drunkard" quite recently.
This pantomime is a sad affair; I was confirmed in this opinion by the fact that even our younger audience were not impressed or amused except in the Third Act when David Kondell - Carpenter's Giant

Either a pantomime must be spectacular-and this is impossible in such a hall-or humorously sophisticated. And speed is an essential. Lack of cooperauon between orenestra ana casi last night increased the slowness. And while the music struggled hard and effectively, only in the last Act were the actors able to throw their voices above the competition.
The slowness was genexal; cues were hardly taken, appearances were delayed and a complete uncertainty governed nearly all the cast. I think the Producer did not realise the difficulties that such a performance presents.

## LACKED WIT AND POINT

The script was certainly lacking in wit and point; the topical reterences were throws away, Even the easy lines were wive out natural emphasis in the mouths of most. We know Hongkong amateurs can do better than just "recite" lines without sense or humour.

What a pity that so much effort has been wasted.! Chris Barber as Jack and Patricia McTavish as Jill both had good voices and personalities. With more 'punch' and opportunity they might have been more outstanding and deliberate.

Of the comics Nario Ferras was comfortable. He gave the impression of understanding the situation, of enjoying playing with an audience, but he was restricted because he received little assistance.

The Giant was the success of the evening, and I wish he had appeared more often.
